

## **Putting the Puzzle Pieces Together**

Second Series: "Top Edge" Old Testament: The Law

Lesson #3: Genesis

### I. Introduction

- A. Genesis is the foundational book to the rest of the Torah (first five books) and to the rest of the Old Testament.
- B. Genesis covers a long period of time (perhaps longer than the rest of the Bible put together). "Genesis 12 Deuteronomy 34 occur in the Bronze and late Bronze ages of near Eastern History. The Patriarch period extended approximately 2000-1600 BC." (A Survey of the Old Testament, p. 53-541)
  - 1. Time period covered:

Creation – Nations 2000 + years

Abraham – Jacob 193 years Joseph 93 years

C. It is primarily a history book that covers these major themes/events:

Distant past of Creation (1-5) (See also Col. 1:16)

Moral failure of ancient world (6)

Flood (7-9)

Nations (10-11)

The Patriarchs (Abraham 12-24, Isaac 24-27, Jacob 28-36 and Joseph 37-50)

- D. Geographically, the story begins in eternity past (creation), focuses on the Garden of Eden (present day Iraq), worldwide flood, call of Abraham from Ur (also Southern Iraq), Abraham and four generations of patriarchs in Canaan and the book ends with Joseph and his family in Egypt.
- E. The Covenant

Genesis 12-50: History of the establishment of the Abrahamic Covenant

Exodus – Deuteronomy: History of the establishment of the Mosaic Covenant

Joshua: Record of God's faithfulness to the Covenant

Samuel – Kings: History of the establishment of the Davidic Covenant

(A Survey of the Old Testament, p. 21-22)

F. New Testament understanding of Old Testament Law

Jesus affirmed the law (Matt. 23:23) but emphasized that the true nature of the law exceeded external behaviors stipulated by the moral code. Paul also affirmed the Law (Rom. 7:12-14).

### The Theology of Genesis

Gen. 1-11: The fall of man triggers the whole history of redemption (Gen. 1-2 compared with Rev. 21-22)

Gen. 12-36: The Abrahamic Covenant – the promises fulfilled in Christ (2 Cor. 1:20) (Christians are his offspring – See Rom. 9:8)

Gen. 37 – 50: Joseph's life foreshadows Jesus Christ (Gen. 50:20 and Acts 2:22-24)

Notice the similarities between Joseph and Jesus

### Primeval History (1:1-11:9)

- A. Creation
  - 1. Creation of the World (1:1-2:3)

Special creation (Ex. 20:11, 31:17, Ps. 33:6-9, 1 Cor. 11:8-9, 15:39, 1 Tim. 2:13), theistic evolution and evolution

Eve created out of Adam

Day One:	Creation of earth, light and probably angels
Day Two:	Separation of the upper and lower waters by space
Day Three:	Creation of plant life
Day Four:	Creation of the sun, moon and stars
Day Five:	Creation of fish and fowl
Day Six:	Creation of land animals and man
Day Seven:	Creation completed. God rests

- 2. Creation of man (2:4-25)
- B. The Fall

Fall of Man (3:1-24)

Temptation, fall, judgment

Five fold judgment on man, woman, nature, serpent and Satan

Conflicting family lines (4:1-5:32)

Cain and Abel, line of Cain, line of Seth

Cain kills Abel

Adam & Eve eat forbidden fruit

- C. The Flood (6:1 9:29)
  - 1. The ungodly multiply

2. Judgment

3. The Flood

Began in November – lasted 371 days. Was worldwide (2 Pet. 3:3-7), Ark was 450 feet long, 75 feet high, 45 feet wide. A capacity of 520 box cars. Total deck space of 20 basketball courts!

Gains Esau's blessing

Life in Haran (Rachel and Leah)

His return and life in Canaan

D. Joseph (37:1 – 50:26)

The corruption of his family

Tested and exalted in Egypt

Salvation of his family

Dies in Egypt

Abraham (100) Sarah (99) promised a son

Isaac offered on the altar

Jacob working for Leah and Rachel

Jacob steals Easu's blessing

Joseph's coat of many colors
