Lesson #9: Angels

I. Introduction: "Even angels long to look into these things." (1 Pet. 1:12)

A. The word "angel":

- 1. Mentioned in 34 books of the Bible (17 times in the Old Testament and 17 times in the New Testament)
- 2. Is a translation of the Hebrew word "Mal'ăk" and the Greek word "Angellos" and means "messenger."
- 3. Other designations which are also applied to angels:
 - a. "Men": Gen. 18:2, Acts 1:10
 - b. "Sons of God": Job 1:6; 2:1; 38:7
 - c. "Watcher" and "Holy Ones": Dan 4:13, 17, 23
 - d. "Rulers in the Heavenlies" (both good and evil) Eph. 3:10, 6:12, Col. 1:16, 2:15
 - e. "Ministering Spirits": Heb. 1:7, 14
 - 1) Before Israel Ex. 14:19
 - 2) For Daniel Dan. 6:22
 - 3) Rescued Peter Acts 12:7
 - 4) Believers Ps. 91:11
- B. The Gospel accounts clearly indicate that Christ assumed and taught the existence of angels.

Mt. 13:39, 18:10, 25:31, 41; 26:53, Mk. 12:25; Lk. 15:10; 16:22, Jn. 1:51

II. Origin of Angels

- A. Biblical evidence for their creation (Neh. 9:6, Ps. 148:1-5; Jn. 1:3; Rom. 8:38-39; Col. 1:16).
- B. Relative time of their creation
 - 1. If "the sons of God" in Job 38:4-7 are angels, then it is evident that the creation of Angels preceded the creation of earth
 - 2. The very fact that angels are divinely created beings precludes their having existed from eternity.

C. Moral condition of their creation.

All angels were originally created in righteousness (Ez. 28:14-15)
Satan and his demons fell from grace (2 Pet. 2:4, Jude 6, Isa. 14:12-14)

- D. Divine purpose for their creation
 - 1. Created for Christ (Col. 1:16)
 - 2. They glorify God in their worship and work (Rev. 4:11)

III. Nature of Angels

- A. They may temporarily adopt the appearance or form of men (Gen. 18:2, 22; 19:1)
- B. They have personality:
 - 1. Intellect (1 Pet. 1:12)
 - 2. Will (Heb. 1:6, Jude 6)
 - 3. Emotion (Job 38:4-7, Luke 2:13; 15:10)
- C. They are designated by masculine gender in the scripture. (Dan. 9:21, 10:10-21, Matt. 28:5; Mark 16:5, Luke 24:4, 23; Acts 10:3, 30-31.)
- D. They do not reproduce (Mark 12:25)
- E. They do not die (Luke 20:36)
- F. They are distinct from human beings (1 Cor. 6:3, Heb. 2:6-7; Heb. 12:22-23)
 - 1. In man's present earthly existence, he is made "a little (while) lower than angels"
 - 2. However, believers in their future glorified state will attain to certain superiorities over angels
 - 3. Rev. 22:9 Both believers and angels are "fellow servants to God". But believers are also joint heirs (Rom. 8:16-7) and will be joint rulers (Rev. 1:6, 5:10) and joint judges (1 Cor. 6:3).
- G. They are a company not a race (Heb. 12:22-23, Rom. 5:12-21)
- H. They are not all the same (Archangel chief angel Jude 9; Seraphim Isa. 6:1-6; Cherubim Eze. 9:3, Ps. 80:1, Ex. 25:18)
- I. They have great knowledge but are not omniscient (2 Sam. 14:17, 20; Ezek. 28:12; Matt. 24:36; 1 Pet. 1:12)
- J. They have great power but are <u>not omnipotent</u> (Ps. 103:20; 2 Thes. 1:7; 2 Pet. 2:11)

Some biblical examples

- 1. 2 Kings 19:35; Isa. 37:36 Power to destroy large multitudes of humans
- 2. Dan. 10:13 Rev. 12:7-9 Power to defeat Satan and his angels
- 3. Matt. 24:30-31 Power to gather the elect
- 4. Matt. 26:53, Ps. 91:11-12 Power to miraculous deliverer people according to God's will
- 5. Rev. 20:1-3 Power to bind Satan and put him abyss
- K. They are swift in flight may appear suddenly but they are not omnipresent (Dan. 9:21; Luke 2:13, Acts 12:7)
- L. They are under the control of God's sovereign will (Gen. 19:12-17; 2 Sam. 24:15-17; Rev. 7:1-3)
- M. A word about children's guardian angels (Matt. 18:10)

IV. So what? Consider Heb. 13:1-2

To brotherly love (Heb. 13:1) add "hospitality" (literally, the "love of strangers") See 1 Tim. 5:10, Titus 1:8, 1 Pet. 4:9

Heb. 13:2 "Do not forget to entertain strangers, for by so doing some people have entertained angels without knowing it."
