

(Like David) A Woman After God's Own Heart #4 Learning from the "cave" experiences of life

I. David's had several "wilderness" experiences in his life.

A. 1 Sam. 21:10-15 He runs away from Saul and ends up before Achish the King of Gath – he ends us acting "insanely"."

Lesson: It never works to take "things" into our own "hands" (Ps. 101:7).

- B. 1 Sam. 22:1-2 He escapes to the <u>cave of Adullum</u>- He pens at least three important Psalms (see also 1 Chron. 12:16-18)
 - 1. The situation

David is a young man in his 20's. He is a man on the run. It's a very low moment in his life and he records his feelings in three "cave poems."

2. Out of his great distress, he writes <u>Psalm 142</u> – a prayer for help in trouble (He is on his face...)

"I cry aloud with my voice" (vs. 1) - I express myself

"I pour out my complaint" (vs. 2) – I'm not happy

"My spirit is overwhelmed" (vs. 3) – I'm drowning

But, "you are my refuge" (vs. 5) - regardless, I'm focused on you!

"I will give thanks, because you have dealt beautifully with me." (vs. 7) – And in the end, I will rehearse your goodness and trust you for more.

3. As time goes by, <u>he writes Psalm 57</u> – a prayer for rescue from his persecutors (He is on his <u>knees</u>...)

"My soul takes refuge in you" (vs. 1) – I will trust <u>only</u> in you! (You accomplish all things, you save me)

"I am surrounded by my enemies" (vs. 4-6) – I am persecuted

"But, I'm steadfast in my praise to you" (vs. 7-11) – But I will sing praises to you.

4. As God re-orients David through this experience, he wrote Psalm 34 – A song extolling the virtues of Yahweh as his provider and deliverer (He is <u>standing</u> toward Heaven and rejoicing...)

Psalm 34:1 "I will extol the LORD at all times; his praise will always be on my lips"

Psalm 34:4 "I sought the LORD, and he answered me; he delivered me from all my fears."

Psalm 34:19 "A righteous man may have many troubles, but the LORD delivers him from them all"

Psalm 34:22 "The LORD redeems his servants; no one will be condemned who takes refuge in him."

C. 1 Sam. 23:5, 26:2 He delivers the inhabitants of Keilah from the Philistines. Saul gives chase and David hides in the wilderness of Ziph – He renews his covenant with Jonathan.

Lesson: God sends encouragement even in "the wilderness" (Matt. 14:27)

D. 1 Sam. 23:25-28 He moves south to <u>the wilderness of Maon</u> and is surrounded by Saul and his men. But the threat of the Philistines forces Saul to meet the Philistines in battle – David is safe at the place called the Rock of Escape.

Lesson: God controls all the circumstances of our lives (Job. 42:2).

E. 1 Sam. 24:1-22 He moves east to the shore of the Dead Sea. His army holds out in front of the rocks of the wild goat <u>in the wilderness of Engedi</u> – he makes a powerful choice to not harm Saul.

Lesson: Honor those in authority (Rom. 13:1).

F. 1 Sam. 25:1 He moves northward to the <u>wilderness of Paran</u> and then south again to the <u>wilderness of Maon</u>. He encounters Nabal and marries Abigal.

Lesson: Peacemakers triumph (Matt. 5:9)!

II. A word about those who joined David in his distress (1 Sam. 22:1-2)

A. His family

Psalm 133:1 "How good and pleasant it is when brothers live together in unity!"

- B. The rejects, the losers, the dropouts:
 - 1. Everyone in distress ("zuk"): Those under pressure, under stress
 - 2. Everyone in debt: those who couldn't pay their debts would soon be sold into slavery.
 - 3. Everyone who was discontent: those who were wronged, mistreated

Note: These are the guys who become the mighty men of God in 2 Sam. 23.

III. So what? David is feeling worthless, useless, mistreated and misunderstood. It's a great opportunity for God to reroute his life!

- 1. He admitted his need...so should we! (Ps. 51:3)
- 2. He asked for help...we must seek <u>His</u> face! (Isa. 41:10)
- 3. He humbled himself before God...He must increase, we must decrease! (Luke 14:11)
