II. "The private you equals the public you" (Luke 6:40)

Who you are in private determines who you are in public

Thought from Oswald Chambers: "My worth to God...in public...is what I am...in private."

A. Do you have Passion for Faithfulness?

Hebrews 11:14-16: "God is not ashamed to be called their God."

B. Do you have a <u>Passion for Holiness?</u>

Rev. 4:8b: "They do not cease to say, Holy, Holy, Holy is the Lord God, the Almighty who was and who is and who is to come."

"To tell you the truth, I love Him because I by Him am eased of my burden, and I am weary of my inward sickness. I would prefer to be where I shall die no more, and with the company that shall continually cry 'Holy, Holy, Holy.'" (Pilgrim's Progress)


C. Do you have a Passion to Share Christ?

Rev. 7:9 "...a great multitude, which no one could count, from every nation and all tribes and peoples and tongues, standing before the throne and before the Lamb..."

III. Remember: "It's a relationship, not a religion"

Intimacy with God is meant to be creative. It's not a formula.

The hearing, reading, studying and memorizing of God's word builds a relationship. It's not a "by the numbers" kind of experience. It's a <u>real</u> expression of a <u>real</u> relationship.



IV. So what? "Intimacy can be developed"

- A. Six simple methods that we can use to study the Bible and develop intimacy with God:
 - 1. Be a news reports: Who, what, where, when, why how?
 - 2. Compare the Bible with the Bible. Read good commentaries.
 - 3. Be a psychologist: Do a character study. What did _____ do? Who did _____ know? What did _____ say? What characteristic is described or implied? How can I become like _____?
 - 4. Be a florist: Gathering verses on a theme from throughout the Bible. Use a good concordance.

- 5. Be a linguist: Study the definition of words (English, Greek, Hebrew). Use a good concordance, the theological wordbooks and dictionaries of words.
- 6. Be an English student: Break the passage down in outline form.
- 7. Be an artist: Use a variety of colors or symbols to mark up your Bible.
- B. Have a "holy huddle" with God on a regular basis. Ask these questions about the passage you are studying:
 - 1. Is there an example for me to follow?
 - 2. Is there a sin to avoid?
 - 3. Is there a promise to claim?
 - 4. Is there a prayer to repeat? (for you or others)
 - 5. Is there a command to obey?
 - 6. Is there a verse to memorize?
- C. And don't forget the other ways to get intimate with our Lord:
 - 1. Singing...
 - 2. Listening...
 - 3. Dancing before the Lord...
 - 4. Fasting...
 - 5. Journaling...
