Woman in the Mirror Lesson #2: Who she isn't

I. Let me tell you a story...about the woman caught in adultery

A. Introduction: John 7:53-8:11

- 1. This section may not have been part of the original text. This account is absent from most of the oldest copies of John's gospel (before the 6th Century). And no Greek author commented on these verses for over 100 years.
- 2. However, on a number of manuscripts, there is a blank spot left on the appropriate page. It may have been omitted because some early Christians felt that this story displayed too lenient of an attitude towards sin.

II. The story line...

A. Time line considerations

Feast of the Tabernacles has just ended (7:2). Everyone left their booths and tents and headed home. Jesus had nowhere to go (Matthew 8:20), so He went to the Mount of Olives. Early the next morning He appears in the outer court (Court of Women) in the Temple.

- B. "He sat down" (like a teacher) and began to teach. He had stood like a herald (7:37) the day before.
- C. "Teacher of the law and Pharisees" were likely in route to where the Sanhedrim met (early on it was the "Hall of Hewn Stones" in a building connected to the temple. Later it was moved to the Court of Gentiles.)
- D. Their purpose:
 - 1. Not to condemn the woman, they were trying to trap Jesus.
 - 2. The emphatic question: "You, there! What do you say?"
 - 3. The issue:

Jewish law condemned her and the man! See. Leviticus 20:10, Deuteronomy 22:22. Roman law did not allow a life to be taken without Roman authority. They were trying to trap Jesus.

- E. The crime: Adultery (Exodus 20:14, Deuteronomy 5:18)
 - "She was caught in the act" GUILTY!
- F. Jesus' reaction

- 1. Stooped down and wrote in the dirt. They kept pestering him.
- 2. He addresses the issue of stoning (Deuteronomy 17:5-7)
- 3. He invites the "one without sin" to cast first
- 4. Then he stooped down again and continued writing
- 5. They scattered oldest first
- G. Jesus asked the woman two questions. He addressed her with the same term He uses for His mother at Cana (John 2:4) and at the cross (John 20:13). It is a term of "infinite tenderness."
 - 1. "Where are they?"
 - 2. "Has no one condemned you?"
- H. "Neither do I" / "Go and sin no more"

The remaining portion of her life was <u>not</u> to be defined by that sin!

III. "The Woman in the Mirror"

- A. We too are overwhelmed
 - 1. Overwhelmed by guilt we have sinned!
 - 2. Overwhelmed by the opinion of others
 - 3. Overwhelmed by a lack of support
 - 4. Overwhelmed by the love of Christ

Romans 8:1 and 31-32 We cannot even condemn ourselves!

B. We (like the woman of John 8) are not defined by our sin.

Forgiveness demands a clean break with sin.

C. We are also <u>not confined</u> by our sin.

Forgiveness demands energy to change and move on!

Our posture: Go...and sin no more!
